Role of Faculty in the DPD Program

- ► Implement & assess specific assignments & activities in courses
- Track student learning outcomes on specific assignments & provided data to program director
- Include knowledge requirements & competencies on syllabi

PROGRAM OF STUDY BS in Dietetics & Nutrition, Dietetics Track

- Program is allowed to set admission criteria for freshmen
 & transfer students
- If the science of nutrition were easy, everyone/anyone could do it.

- See 4-year Step-by-Step Progression handout

PROGRESSION THROUGH PROGRAM

Accept grades of C or above only

Must complete all required prerequisites; NO overrides

■Save time & trouble by scheduling midsemester required advising EVERY semester

DPD Handbook includes...

- Program mission & goals
- ■Pathway to become an RDN
- Policies, procedures, & regulations regarding
 - ■Student complaints
 - Academic standing
 - Academic misconduct/integrity
 - Importance of volunteering

Note to International Students: CPT

- Undergrad DPD students are <u>NOT</u> eligible for <u>Curricular Practical Training</u>
 - DPD has no field experiences that qualify for academic credit
 - CPT allows qualified F-1 status students to gain practical experience in their field of study while making progress towards completion of academic program.
 - ►FIU graduate-level DI students qualify for CPT

Note to International Students: OPT

- ➤ Optional Practical Iraining = period during which UG & graduate students with F-1 status are permitted to get practical training to complement their field of study once academic program is completed.
 - Affects students applying to free-standing DI programs
 - Speak with DI program directors at the programs to which you are applying to learn about their international student policies

HOW BECOME CREDENTIALED

- Registered Dietitian Nutritionist (RDN) = nationally recognized credential for nutrition experts
- Steps to obtain
 - Complete an accredited undergraduate program (DPD)
 - Complete an accredited dietetic internship (DI) of 1200 hours (usually unpaid) → requires a separate application process via DICAS
 - 3. Pass the national RDN examination on the first sitting

SUPERVISED PRACTICE = Dietetic Internship (DI)

- Apply your didactic knowledge & skills under direction of fulltime RDNs
- Goal is "entry level competency"
- All DIs follow ACEND accreditation standards
- Need 1200 hours experience in 3 key areas:
 - CLINICAL + COMMUNITY + FOOD SERVICE/SCIENCE
- A few programs offers a small salary; usually intern pays tuition & living expenses

BEST ADVICE for SUCCESS

- 2 kinds of education goals
 - 1. PERFORMANCE = "I will work my way up to 500 sit ups each day."
 - 2. **LEARNING = more powerful** = to actually master the material until it becomes a habit

BEST ADVICE for SUCCESS

- Do not wait for things to be handed to you
 - Show initiative
 - Find opportunities >> they are everywhere; say "yes" as
 often as possible
- Have fun, make new friends, seek out meaningful experiences, & enjoy your time at FIU
- Keep Calm & Study Dietetics!

- Life-long process
 - Introduced here & in DIE 3005 (Orientation to Dietetics class)
 - Reinforced/enhanced throughout curriculum
 - Culminates & is assessed in DIE 4506 (Seminar in Dietetics)

- Expected to exhibit professionalism in
 - **Demeanor**: consistent with Code of Ethics for the Professional of Dietetics
 - ▶ Dress: project image of self-confidence, self-respect, & respect for others
 - ► Attitude: gratitude for opportunity to learn from others
 - **Behavior**: respect to fellow students, faculty, administrators, all persons whether on or off campus

- Components of professionalism:
 - Reliability
 - Collegiality
 - Positive attitude towards learning
 - ■Initiative & self-motivation
 - ■Balance between humility & confidence in one's ability

- Components of professionalism cont'd:
 - Maturity
 - Class professionalism → applies to Zoom as well...
 - Follows DPD handbook dress code
 - Personal phone is off during class times
 - ■No gum chewing or eating in classrooms
 - Avoids dishonesty or being complicit in dishonesty
- Allegiance to the profession: memberships, completing surveys, mentoring/precepting fellow students
